

ENVIRONMENTAL PROGRAM

The Intersection of the Local and the Global in Environmental Grassroots Activism started as simply an idea to have an environmentally-focused program, but it blossomed into a week full of events centered around international environmental grassroots activism and local sustainability efforts. In total, we engaged with almost 1,000 participants here on the College

Station and Galveston campuses. This program even led us to participate in the national Disaster PRIMR (Prepare, Respond, Innovate, Mitigate, and Recover) conference.at University of North Texas in March.

Our On-Campus Executive Erin Dent represented the L.T. Jordan Institute on March 6-8, 2022 at the Disaster PRIMR Conference, which aims to bring together a variety of people who are involved in preparing for, responding to, and mitigating disaster events, from wildfires to floods to pandemics and everything in between. L.T. Jordan does a lot of great work in introducing students to many different international issues (like disaster management), and Erin notes that presenting our Fall 2021 program at the conference made her realize that we have so much potential to create a connection between students and the people already working in various fields to solve human-made and natural disasters.

"We are able to show to professionals and leaders the importance of involving students, even at an undergraduate level, and we are able to show students the different ways in which they can be involved and to connect them with established professionals and leaders. Before attending the conference, I thought I knew what disaster management was, but I did not realize the full extent of what it involves. For example, I had never thought about how to communicate on weather to communities whose primary language is not English or about how disasters can precipitate legal problems surrounding home ownership, but these are absolutely important issues, especially for someone (like myself) who is interested in working in environmental justice."

There were many goals for this program: to illustrate that we must remember that we all live on one planet, to show that the effects of environmental degradation are not equitable, and, most of all, to remind our students that we have the power and responsibility to be stewards for our planet.

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LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

Since 2019, I have served in many different roles within the Memorial Student Center Leland T. and Jessie J. Jordan Institute, and it has been an honor to see how the committee has transformed and adapted over the years. I can honestly say that my experience with the L.T. Jordan Institute has been a rollercoaster of excitement, growth, and adventure. As the current Chair of the L.T. Jordan Institute for International Awareness, I am pleased to share with you the work our committee has done this year to provide international exposure amid the world-altering constraints produced by the pandemic and other global events.



The L.T. Jordan Institute, along with the rest of the Texas A&M campus, resumed 100% in-person activities for the 2021-2022 academic year following the easing of COVID-19 lockdown restrictions. We encountered many challenges during this transition; however, we embraced this change with an earnest desire to spread more selflessness and thoughtfulness to the world.

In the Fall semester, we hosted an environmental grassroots activism event to bolster local sustainability efforts through collaboration with the Texas A&M Galveston campus and environmentally-oriented leaders who have worked in Thailand, South Africa, and Ghana. We also selected 5 student researchers to participate in our Fellows program, 13 students to participate in our Internship and Living Abroad program, and one student to participate in our International Service program. And we continue to support Aggies on their travel abroad excursions through our non-interest-bearing overseas loan fund. This Spring, we are entering the 4th season of our Many Aggies, One World podcast series, and are partnering with the Bush School of Government and Public Service to highlight Mexican artists from the Oaxacan region. We also worked with the TAMU International Studies Department, the Houston Russian Cultural Center, and MaroonBase to showcase the film *Gorbachev. Heaven* during our annual Russian Film Festival.

When I first joined the L.T. Jordan Institute my freshman year as a member, I had no idea how large of an impact that L.T. Jordan had on the Texas A&M student body and local community. Since then, this committee has taught me how to be a more effective leader, and more importantly, they gave me a community. They showed me how L.T. Jordan shapes the experiences of students on campus through our programming, and how I can support others who come from different and/or marginalized backgrounds. I look forward to seeing how the Institute's future leaders will continue to expand our reach on the Texas A&M campus, in the Bryan/College Station community, and around the world.

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FELLOWS CLASS OF 2021-22 BIOGRAPHIES

The MSC L.T. Jordan Fellows Program provides highly qualified Texas A&M University students with the opportunity for personal enrichment and education through an international research project. Participants design a specific independent research project that will enhance their education or professional goals. The program annually selects qualified graduate or undergraduate students to conduct their research abroad. This year, the Fellow's 34th class consists of four graduate students: Kristian Cantens, Sami Jabarkhail, Charlotte Jarvis, Tanner Ogle and one undergraduate student Sarah Judkins.

Kristian Cantens is a 5th year PhD student in Philosophy. He is currently in Spain conducting his research on the present-day controversies that surround the practice of bullfighting. To understand the nature of this moral disagreement, Kristian plans on examining the various images, metaphors, and myths that Spaniards make use of in orienting themselves to this rich tradition. Some see it as torture, and urge that we enter into the bull's perspective. Others see it as art, and celebrate the skills and virtues displayed by the matador. Why are some inclined to imagine it in one way and others in a different way?

Sami Jabarkhail is a Fulbright scholar and a PhD Candidate in the Department of Educational Administration and Human Resource Development. During his time as a PhD student, Sami has taught several courses and managed teams of undergraduate researchers. Additionally, Sami often writes op-ed articles on US foreign policy towards Afghanistan. In 2014, Sami was selected by the Atlantic Council in a worldwide competition to attend the NATO Future Leaders Summit in Cardiff, Wales. He has used his L.T. Jordan Institute Fellowship grant to study the educational challenges and opportunities of Afghan refugees in Tajikistan.

Charlotte Jarvis is finishing up her MSc in the Department of Anthropology's Nautical Archaeology Program. Her thesis looks at genever (the original form of the gin we know today) consumption amongst Dutch and British Sailors during the Age of Sail (1550-1850). The primary findings of this research include insight into the staggeringly high amounts of alcohol that sailors drank and a possible

new way to identify shipwrecks of unknown origins. Over the winter break, she was able to travel to the Netherlands to conduct primary source research in the archives and meet with scholars in the field of Dutch maritime history and genever production. She also experienced some Dutch Christmas and New Years traditions!

Tanner Ogle is a second-year PhD student in the History Department. He is currently conducting research on how memories of the Jacobite Rebellion of 1745 influenced policy-making during the American Revolution. This summer Tanner will explore the papers of nearly a dozen Scots with ties to both the '45 and the American Revolution. While conducting archival research at five repositories in Edinburgh, Scone, and the Isle of Bute, Tanner will also visit the cultural sites related to the '45 and former properties of the Scots he is researching.

Sarah Judkins is a 4th year undergraduate in the Department of Landscape Architecture and Urban Design. This summer, she plans to travel to Detroit, Montreal, and Toronto to study inner city challenges and responses to food insecurity. Sarah will investigate methods of urban cultivation to understand facets of environmental justice. She hopes to learn how to plan at a city-wide level to turn agricultural green spaces into a municipal utility. Sarah looks forward to conversing with policymakers, community garden locals, and underserved community members to gain insight into connecting gardens into a comprehensive network.

INTERNSHIP AND LIVING ABROAD PROGRAM AND INTERNATIONAL SERVICE PROJECT By:Ethan Beauregard '22

Both the Internship and Living Abroad Program (ILAP) and International Service Project (ISP) allow Texas A&M students to study abroad and gain work experience all over the world. As the name suggests, ILAP is focused on providing professional internships to students based on their major or future career goals. ISP is a community-based service project for high-achieving undergraduate and graduate students, usually in the fields of environmental sciences, public health, or marine conservation.

This year, our participants will have the opportunity to go to either England, Singapore, Spain, or Costa Rica for six weeks or longer. Both programs provide cultural immersion, professional skills, and amazing experiences that will last a lifetime. The students spend time during the spring semester preparing for travel abroad, learning how to be safe, successful, and culturally confident. They are committed to performing exceptionally in the countries of their choice and representing Texas A&M, the MSC L.T. Jordan Institute, and themselves with excellence on a global scale.

A COMMUNITY CONVERSATION

On March 9, 2022, the L.T. Jordan Institute for International Awareness and the International Student Association held a safe-space for Ukrainian and Russian Bryan/College Station members to come together as a community to discuss the global and personal impact of the ongoing war in Ukraine.

Our conversations ranged from talking about our feelings of guilt, our loved ones in the region, our understanding of the invasion, the damage caused by misinformation and propaganda, our desire for peace, and most importantly, our solidarity of support for the Ukrainian people. 
